# Phil's Corner—Phil Evaul

#### STATE OF THE CHURCH

Every January the President delivers a "State of the Union" address. I'm not real sure what the original purpose of the speech was – perhaps it was an opportunity for the President to outline how he thought the country was doing; in other words, the state of the union.

Ever since I started watching those addresses, however, it seems the speech has morphed into an opportunity for the President to tell us where he wants to take the union. "The State of the Union As It Should Be in My Vision," it should be called. The Presidents have used this occasion to lay out new programs they want to institute (free community college to go along with a chicken in every pot!), new taxes they want to levy, and areas where government should grow.

Ah, but I'm getting a little off the subject. Here's where I'm going with this: Perhaps this is a good opportunity for us to speak about the State of the Church.

Although we are a small and aging bunch, I continue to be impressed with the spiritual maturity of our church family. I delight in telling outsiders that our people love the Lord, they love His Word, and they love one another. It is encouraging to see folks bringing their Bibles to church. I was at a church many years ago where no one brought their Bibles – they weren't needed, sad to say. It is also encouraging to see that you know your way around your Bible, and you know what the Bible says. I have to stay on my toes. I can't be careless about what I say, because many of you will check me on it. I don't mind being questioned or challenged; in fact, I like that. You are and should be good Bereans.

I see ways in which many of you show love toward one another. You are praying for one another, crying together, rejoicing together. You seem to genuinely care about what's going on in the lives of those around you. You also are generous toward addressing needs outside our church family. We support several missionaries and organizations with our prayers and finances, and have a small pantry of canned goods for needy neighbors. And you are certainly generous in your care for your pastor and his wife.

For those of you who are not able to attend services regularly, let me catch you up to speed. On Sunday mornings we're about half way through our study of 1 John. From there we'll proceed right into 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> John, and then Jude.

On Sunday evenings we've studied Israel during the time of the kings. We've just finished 2 Kings and 2 Chronicles, and will proceed with Ezra, Nehemiah, Esther, and the other post-exilic books.

On Wednesdays we take a brief look at some of the prayers in the Bible, and then we spend several minutes in prayer. As long as I'm here we will continue to be committed to the inerrancy of God's Word, its authority in our lives, and the primacy of teaching and preaching the Word.

Financially, we continue to be amazed at how the Lord provides through your faithfulness and sacrificial giving. We have had some major expenses in the last couple of years. Replacing all the plumbing in the entire building, and major repairs on our HVAC units are two of the most recent large projects.

In spring our parking lot will finally be resurfaced. The water company is going to pay for paving the parts that the broken water main damaged, and we will pay to resurface the undamaged areas, to give us a uniform and smooth surface. Our share of the costs will be around \$7000.

Meanwhile, some of the ladies are cleaning, organizing and updating the kitchen. The cost of a new stove has already been underwritten by one of our members.

Here are two opportunities for you to give above and beyond your usual contributions, if you are so inclined. I am grateful that we have not had to make constant appeals for money. You all have been very generous, and our Elders and Deacons have tried to be good stewards of your gifts. If you would like to make a special gift toward the parking lot or the kitchen, please indicate so on your check.

We noted in a recent message that we are at a stage in our church's life where we don't have any children or young people. On the one hand, that is very sad and we'd like to see new families with kids join us. On the other hand, we recognize that right now the Lord's purpose for us is to minister to older folks. The focus of my job is to get us ready for heaven. I embrace that calling. Pray with us that we will be faithful in ministering to -shall we say -a more mature group.

It has been a delight, a pleasure, a privilege, and an honor to be a part of this church family for going on 19 years. You are all very patient and tolerant with me, a sinner saved by grace. Thank you.

May all that we do - as individuals and as a congregation - in 2015 be fully to the honor of the Lord Jesus Christ.

## **Church News and Prayer Requests**

The parking lot is still in the news. The water company's insurance company denied the claim for damage to our parking lot caused by the burst water main on Griffith Street. The Northwest Utility District (formerly Sale Creek Utility District) has agreed to pay for the damage to the parking lot that was caused by the burst main. This represents around \$7,000 but just for about half of the parking lot since only half was affected by the damage. Therefore, it is up to the church to determine how to fix the rest. The consensus opinion was that packed crusher run or some relatively inexpensive fix was not acceptable or in the best interest of the church because dust from such an alternative would be tracked into the church. Therefore, we have no other valid option at this time than to pay \$7,000 to have the remaining half of the parking lot resurfaced with asphalt at the same time as the water company's work. The work will be postponed until spring when warm weather can be expected. With the above in mind, we would like to encourage anyone who can spare it to make a special offering to defray the \$7,000 expense. We ask for this additional amount above regular offering because at the same time a number of ladies in the church are wishing to do some much needed upgrades and improvements to the kitchen. Please keep these two projects in your thoughts and prayers as you determine how you can best assist with your giving.

Jim Dvorak has been sick recently with flu-like symptoms. It is very unusual for Jim to miss church, so when he is gone for two or three weeks, it is very noticeable. Please keep Jim in your prayers that he will get over this soon.

Barbara Metzger has come up with an idea that she would like to propose to everyone. Barbara states, "We would like to start something called "Fellowship Dinners" here at the Church. Here's how it would work: there is a Host Home and that person provides the main course and drinks. Then names of the people who want to participate are put in a hat and 4 or 6 other names are drawn out at random. Then the host family calls those on her list to set day, time and what side dish the others will bring. It's just a fun way to get to know folks in a casual way and enjoy a good meal and fellowship. Also, it might be a good outreach by inviting an un-churched family that you know. They might enjoy coming and getting to know us in a nonthreatening, casual atmosphere instead of a "church" setting and might be more apt to come to church later. Never know how God can use small things.

So, if you would like to be involved either as a host family or a dinner guest, please let me know by replying to this e-mail or calling. If hosting, decide how many others you want to fit around your dining room table. The date, time, etc. can be decided by Hostess after talking to those on your list of dinner guests. Pick an evening, or even Sunday after church for those who would rather not be out at night - go with whatever day and time works best for those on your list. Remember, we don't need as many Host families as we do "diners" so if you aren't comfortable hosting or your time is short, please sign up to come and bring a side dish and enjoy a fun evening.

Remember the Outreach aspect of this also! Thanks so much for considering this fun way to fellowship with our church family and hopefully some from outside our church."
