## Phil's Corner—Phil Evau

They say that every snowflake is unique, that no two snowflakes are exactly alike. I don't know if anyone has ever examined every single flake to make sure that's right, but I'll take their word for it.

That fact reminds me that the Creator has a great imagination. I don't know if He purposely and personally designs each snowflake, or if He simply designed the laws of nature in such a way that would ensure that each flake would be unique. Either way, His abilities are pretty impressive.

One could even say, wastefully impressive. I mean, whoever gets to appreciate the intricate design in each flake? We had nearly a foot of snow earlier in February, as did much of the eastern seaboard. Can you fathom how many individual flakes that would be? And who saw all of those flakes to appreciate their beauty? Maybe the angels, but I'm guessing that they have more important things to do than examine crystals in the snow. Maybe only God Himself could examine each individual flake of snow, give it His stamp of approval, and send it down from the clouds to be absorbed in the blanket of white covering the earth – to disappear unnoticed except by Himself.

In a few weeks the same thing is going to happen with millions of wildflowers that will pop up out of the warming soil deep in the woods where no one will see them. They will bloom for a few days, then wither away without ever being noticed by anyone but their Creator.

It may be wastefully impressive, but I trust the Creator achieves a measure of satisfaction for His efforts. The Biblical phrase would be "for His own glory."

And even if we can't examine each snowflake or each wildflower, we should at least be impressed with the level of

care that the Lord has for His creation. And we should appreciate the beauty that we *are* privileged to see, and give Him appropriate glory for it. Jesus said the Father is aware of every sparrow that falls. If that's the case, can you fathom the depth of His care for you, His adopted child, His chosen one for whom He died?

Or think about it this way: If you look in your concordance, you'll find about 24 verses with "snow" in them. Some of them speak of the refreshment of a snowfall (c'mon, admit it: weren't you as giddy as a school kid at the prospect of a significant snow accumulation last month?).

Some of the verses speak of snow as a picture of purity. That's appropriate; we also speak of something being 'pure as the driven snow.'

Similarly, snow is also a picture of cleanliness. I know you're already thinking of the verses I have in mind. You probably have them underlined in your Bible.

"Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean: wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow" (Ps 51:7). David expresses the deep longing of all of us: that we could be cleansed of our sin and be released from its hold on our lives.

The gracious Father responds in Isaiah 1:18, "Come now, and let us reason together, saith the Lord: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool." It is His desire to cleanse that sin from us, even if it means He has to suffer and die to make it happen.

Wow! It's enough to make your head spin. It almost seems wastefully impressive, doesn't it?

May He get glory from what He's done in His chosen ones. And may you give Him glory for how He has created, and then recreated, you.

## Church Dinners Were More Spartan In Early Days of Church

In this picture taken in early 1937 a special dinner was held for elder William Irvin. Only a few people are recognizable in the picture. At the very far end of the table stands Addison Downy. Florence Coulter is in the doorway and Gertie List is to her left. Standing directly to Gertie's left is the pastor, Reverend L.D. Phillips. Seated halfway on the right side of the table is the honoree, Mr. William Irvin and directly behind him, last boy in front is Jimmy Phillips, son of Rev. Phillips. In the front foreground on the right is Mr. W.A. Stultz.

When the church was first constructed and opened in January of 1926, there was no kitchen or dining room per se. The large classroom in the basement served as the eating area for dinners, receptions, and other special events. Besides dinners, many showers and wedding receptions were held in that room.

For many years the large room served as a classroom on Sundays for the young people's class which was last led by Mrs. Martha McDonald, wife of Roy McDonald. The room immediately in back was known as the kitchen primarily because it had a stove in it...nothing much else. Water was provided through means of the faucet protruding at the end of the hallway.

When dinners were held in the basement, all of the chairs were either moved out of the room or else lined up around the edges of the room. The adults usually either sat or stood in the room or out in the hallway. The children went into one of the small classrooms in the basement where there were small chairs and classroom tables on which to set their food. A few of those little chairs remain in use in the nursery

and are older than any of the members of the church. (One of them says "Made on Noah's Ark, 8500 B.C.")

Some of our current members can remember some of these events from our childhoods. The things that I remembered most were (1) stay out of the room with the food until the room is ready for eating, (2) there were always fresh hot rolls that everyone loved (especially me), (3) we were always told by one busy body to only take one roll and not come back to the line until all the guests were through (which we would not have done anyway, (4) Mrs. McDonald or Mrs. Gertie List (or both) always brought a ham, (5) the smells are still in my head from all that good cooking.

The celebration above took place in early 1937 on the occasion of Mr. William Irvin's 88th birthday. Mr. Irvin was a long time elder in the church and was a Union Army veteran of the Civil War. This picture was made early in the year because the people are wearing sweaters and long-sleeved shirts and Mr. Phillips is shown in the picture. He died in September of that year.

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
